Course Description

This course surveys a broad range of topics in social psychology. It will familiarize you with theoretical and empirical strategies social psychologists have developed to understand social psychological phenomena such as attitudes, conformity, aggression, prejudice, altruism, and attraction.

Tests

There will be three in-class tests during the term. The tests in this course are non-cumulative tests with multiple choice questions. Each will only cover material not covered on previous tests (see schedule for material to be covered). No personal electronic devices (e.g., iPads, cell phones), notes, or books are allowed during tests. There is no registrar scheduled final exam in this course.

Class participation

There will be opportunities to participate throughout the term (typically weekly, with a few exceptions) in small group discussions, demonstrations, and exercises. It is to your benefit to participate. This will give you an opportunity to apply what you are learning, share your opinions, and learn about your classmates' opinions. Student names will be collected each time this occurs and quantity/quality of participation will be assessed with a mark out of 10 assigned each time. Here are some examples of grades a student might receive: if a student is not present* for participation activities the participation grade for that week = 0, if a student is present but does not participate or very minimally participates (e.g., does not form a group when group work is a component of the exercise, does not speak to other group members, arrives to class with only 5 minutes remaining in activity) participation grade for that week = 5, if a student actively participates in the small group activities participation for that week = 9, if a student actively participates in the small group activities and larger group discussion participation for that week = 10. These marks will be averaged and at the end of the term you will receive a participation mark out of 10. Keep in mind that a student could get a 10 every time they come but if they only attend a few times their final participation grade could end up much lower. Attendance is important. *without a documented excuse. If the student has a documented excuse for their absence their participation mark for the week will be pro-rated.

Thought paper

One thought paper 3-4 pages double-spaced in length (with 12 pt Times New Roman font and 1" margins) worth 10% where you will apply social psychological theories or concepts that you have learned about in class (either in textbook and/or lecture*) to a real life event (either from your own life or from a newspaper article). This paper is intended to help you develop insight into everyday experiences using concepts discussed in the course. Further details will be provided in class and posted

on D2L. You will be evaluated on your description of the experience or article, your definition of social psychology principles, and style (full rubric will be posted on D2L). Due October 26th at 4pm in the D2L dropbox. **LATE PAPERS WILL RECEIVE A 10% PENALTY PER DAY INCLUDING WEEKENDS.**

*If you want to read ahead in the textbook and cover something from a chapter that has not yet been covered in class this is fine.

Research Proposal

One research proposal 3-4 pages double-spaced in length (with 12 pt Times New Roman font and 1" margins) worth 10% where you will propose a novel study to test a social psychological question of your choice. Your research proposal should include 1) a rationale for the research with background literature to support your hypothesis or hypotheses, and 2) a description of the method that you propose to test your research question. This research proposal is intended to help you to think about social psychological questions from a scientific perspective. Further details will be provided in class and posted on D2L. You will be evaluated on your identification of a research question, identification of significance of the research, drawing on existing knowledge to inform hypothesis, proposed methodology, and style (full rubric will be posted on D2L). Due Nov.30th at 4pm in the D2L dropbox. LATE PAPERS WILL RECEIVE A 10% PENALTY PER DAY INCLUDING WEEKENDS.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology professors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

Reappraisal of Graded Term Work http://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/i-2.html

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (term paper, essay, test, etc.) has been unfairly graded, may have the paper re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within fifteen days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Director of Undergraduate Studies who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next fifteen days. Students in faculties without a departmental structure should take the matter to the dean or the associate/assistant dean (Academic/Student Affairs) of the faculty offering the course. The result of that reassessment should be given to the student in writing. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered or to remain the same.

Reappraisal of Final Grade http://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/i-3.html

In the reappraisal of a final grade, the only element that will be considered is the grading of the final assessment that makes up the final mark (e.g., final examination, final project, final paper). An exception may occur when the Instructor of Record evaluates a piece of graded term work at the end of the term; that grade may also be considered in a reappraisal of final grade.

A student wishing a reappraisal of a final grade should first attempt to review the final assessment with the department or faculty offering the course. After which, the student shall obtain a Reappraisal of Final Grade form from ucalgary.ca/registrar (under Student Forms). Students must indicate exactly what error was made in marking the final assessment and/or in computing the final grade. The reappraisal will only be considered if the student provides a detailed rationale that outlines where and for what reason an error is suspected.

Students wishing a reappraisal of a final grade (excluding Law courses) must submit their request by the following dates:

Fall Term – March 1
Winter Term – June 30
Spring Intersession – August 15
Summer Term – October 15
Supplemental Examinations: 30 calendar days from the date the examination was written

The reappraisal form shall be submitted to Enrolment Services who will forward it to the department head or dean of the faculty offering the course. Reappraisals of final grades are dealt with by the head of the academic unit in consultation with members of academic staff. Normally, the department/faculty will respond to a reappraisal request within thirty calendar days of its initiation. After the reappraisal is completed, the department shall return the form to the Registrar's Office who shall inform the student in writing of the decision. Students should be aware that the grade being reappraised may be raised, lowered or remain the same. A student may request a reappraisal of final grade only twice in one academic year (September 1 – August 31).

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Seating During Exams

Instructors and exam invigilators are free to ask students to move seats before an exam begins or even during an exam. Students must comply with this request and refusal to do so may warrant a charge of academic misconduct.

Absence From A Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are **NOT** an option without an official University medical excuse (see the University Calendar). A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a test/exam for health reasons; the student will be required to pay any cost associated with this Statement. Students who miss a test/exam have up to 48 hours to contact the instructor and to schedule a makeup test/exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup test/exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled test/exam. Except in extenuating circumstances (documented by an official University medical excuse), a makeup test/exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed test/exam during exam make-up hours provided by the department http://psychology.ucalgary.ca/undergraduate/exam-and-course-information#mues. If a student cannot write their final exam on the date assigned by the Registrar's Office, they need to apply for a deferred exam http://www.ucalgary.ca/registrar/exams/deferred_final.

Travel During Exams

Consistent with University regulations, students are expected to be available to write scheduled exams at any time during the official December and April examination periods. Requests to write a make-up exam because of conflicting travel plans (e.g., flight bookings) will NOT be considered by the department. Students are advised to wait until the final examination schedule is posted before making any travel arrangements. If a student cannot write their final exam on the date assigned by the Registrar's Office, they need to apply for a deferred exam http://www.ucalgary.ca/registrar/exams/deferred final. Students with an exceptional extenuating circumstance (e.g., a family emergency) should contact the Department of Psychology (psyugrd@ucalgary.ca).

Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) Act

The FOIP legislation disallows the practice of having student's retrieve tests and assignments from a public place. Therefore, tests and assignments may be returned to students during class/lab, or during office hours, or will be made available only for viewing during exam review sessions scheduled by the Department. Tests and assignments will be shredded after one year. Instructors should take care to not link students' names with their grades, UCIDs, or other FOIP-sensitive information.
