Course Description

This course will focus on applying concepts in developmental psychology research, such as measurement design, data collection techniques, ethical considerations, statistical approaches, and reports and presentations. This course will include synchronous Zoom sessions twice a week. All Zoom sessions will be recorded and posted on D2L.

Research Project

There is no written test or exam for this course. The main source of evaluation will be the research project. You will be graded on this project in four instances: the research proposal, the first oral presentation, the second oral presentation, and the final paper. These three tasks will contribute towards **55%** of your final grade for this semester.

These research projects will be designed in small groups (3-5), presented as a group via video recording, but written individually. In the first few weeks, you will work in groups to design a research question, a hypothesis, and a basic methodology. You will present your hypotheses and research questions on **March 9th via Zoom as a group**. This will be a 5-7 minute presentation. More information on the presentations will be posted to D2L. you will work on your own to write the research proposal which is

due **March 11**th **via D2L**. This research proposal should be 5 pages in length (excluding title page, references, and any appendices), double spaced with size 12 font and 1 inch margins.

Starting on **April 13**th **via Zoom**, you will present your research findings as a group. This will be a 5-7 minute presentation. More information on the presentations will be posted to D2L. Then you will write a final research report due **April 15**th **via D2L**. The final report will be 8-10 page final research report (excluding title page, references, and any appendices). The report should be double spaced with size 12 font and 1 inch margins. This report will contain all the elements of a research article.

Peer Review

When you submit your Research Proposal via D2L, you will also receive two research proposals written by your peers. You will be responsible for providing qualitative feedback on the written work of two of your peers. You will not be assigning them grades, only feedback. Your written feedback to your peers is due on **April 1**st **via email**. You will be evaluated based on the quality of feedback that you provide.

Assignments

There will be 10 small lab assignments which are each worth 4% of your final grade. Each of these assignments will be associated with an in-class (synchronous activity) that you will complete via Zoom on Thursdays and will be submitted via D2L on the following Tuesday. Each assignment will include working in pairs with one other student (via breakout rooms on Zoom) and completing a 1-page lab report. The assignments will include:

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.
