Course Description and Goals:

This course is designed to introduce the student to the knowledge base, ethical orientation, practical skills and research focus required of clinical psychologists. Students will learn about the professional components of the field, including training models, codes of conduct, and regulatory aspects of the profession. The course will cover applied skills involved in assessment, diagnosis and therapy. A number of theoretical models of therapy will be discussed with an emphasis on the cognitive and behavioral approaches. The laboratory will cover some practical applications of clinical psychology through demonstrations, videotapes, and role plays.

Evaluation

Students will be expected to attend all lectures and labs, to read the assigned materials, and to participate in classroom and lab activities. There will be two exams: one 1.25-hour midterm exam (**Feb 26th**) and a 2-hour final exam to be scheduled by the Registrar's office during the final exam period. The exams will cover the material presented in the text, readings, lectures and labs. They will include multiple choice and short essay questions. In addition, lab requirements will be reviewed during the first week of classes.

Lab Requirements:

The lab section is worth 30% of the total mark for this course. Marks will be based on the following:

Students are expected to attend labs regularly and to *participate* in discussions. For every lab, each student will receive a mark for participation in class exercises and discussion. Normally students will not be able to make up marks for missed labs. In the event that a student must miss a lab, a completed Physician/Counsellor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a lab for health reasons. The student will be required to pay any cost associated with the Physician/Counsellor Statement. Students who must miss a lab must contact the Teaching Assistant before the lab begins (preferably) or within 24 hours of missing the lab. Failure to do so will result in a participation mark of 0 for that lab.

Students must achieve a passing grade on both the class and lab components to pass this course.

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Students should examine sections of the University Calendar that present a Statement of Intellectual honesty and definitions and penalties associated with Plagiarism/Cheating/Other Academic Misconduct.

Academic Accommodation

Absence From A Test

Make-up exams are NOT an option without an official University medical excuse (see the University Calendar). You must contact the instructor <u>before</u> the scheduled examination or you will have forfeited any right to make up the exam. At the instructor's discretion, a make-up exam

may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled exam. Except in extenuating circumstances (documented by an official University medical excuse), a makeup exam is written within two (2) weeks of the missed exam. A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a test for health reasons. The student will be required to pay any cost associated with the Physician Counselor Statement.

Course Credits for Research Participation

Students in most psychology courses are eligible to participate in Departmentally approved research and earn credits toward their final grades. A maximum of two credits (2%) per course, including this course, may be applied to the student's final grade. Students earn 0.5% (0.5 credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation. The demand for timeslots may exceed the supply in a given term. Thus, students are not guaranteed that there will be enough studies available to them to meet their credit requirements. Students should seek studies early in the term and should frequently check for open timeslots.
