Course Description and Goals

Research project in psychology conducted under the supervision of a faculty member. The course will provide opportunity to design, revise, and implement an appropriate literature search. Evaluate that information for design of a survey, collect data, and prepare data for presentation to stakeholders.

The research study will aim to identify motivational factors that influence primary caregivers of children with neurodevelopmental disorders to participate in research. The objectives include: 1) conducting a comprehensive review of the relevant literature to understand what is known about families' perceptions of research participation, and 2) surveying primary caregivers (i.e., parents) that sign up for a dedicated neurodevelopmental research recruitment database to understand their motivations for research participation.

Gaining a stronger understanding of why caregivers participate may allow researchers to improve participation and optimize research participant experience. Potential implications of this research include improving the recruitment experience for families participating in research, broadening recruitment efforts to include more diverse populations, and ensuring the consent process is appropriate for participant's understanding of research and expectation of research outcomes.

Comprehensive review of relevant literature (25% of Grade)

Student will conduct a comprehensive review of the relevant literature to understand what is known about families' perceptions of research participation. Literature review must be submitted no later than Jan 30, 2021 by 11:59 PM via email to co-supervisors. Page limit 10 pages double spaced. Late assignments will not be accepted without instructor approval.

Define survey (10% of Grade)

Student will design survey questions based on relevant literature, to administer to and assess parents perception of research participation. Survey must be submitted no later than Jan 11, 2023 by 11:59 PM via email to cosupervisors. Page limit 5 pages. Late assignments will not be accepted without instructor approval.

Data collection (30% of Grade)

Student will survey primary caregivers (e.g., parents) to understand their motivations for research participation. Spread sheet of data from survey must be submitted no later than March 24th, 2023 by 11:59 PM via email to cosupervisors. **Late assignments will not be accepted without instructor approval.**

Summarize data (25% of Grade)

Student will complete a written summary with analysis of survey results following data collection. Summary must be submitted no later than April 12th by 11:59 PM via email to co-supervisors. Page limit 5 pages double spaced. Late assignments will not be accepted without instructor approval.

Present findings (10% of Grade)

Student will either (1) present findings to relevant stakeholders or (2) share with families with children of neurodevelopmental disorders in the form of a newsletter. Presentation or newsletter must be completed no later than April 12th, 2023 by 11:59 PM. **Late assignments will not be accepted without instructor approval.**

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology professors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.
