PSYC 305.01 HISTORY OF PSYCHOLOGICAL THOUGHT Winter 2022

Course Description

The course explores the roots of psychological thought in Western culture and the relationship between theories of human nature and changing social institutions. We will begin by exploring the origins of psychological thought throughout history, starting with the philosophy of Ancient Greek and Romans. From there, we will move to the beginnings of modern science and explore the contributions of figures such as Darwin, Descartes, Locke, Mill, and Helmholtz, among others. The early founders of psychology, including Wundt and James, will then receive their due. We will then move on to explore the major schools of thought, including Structuralism, Functionalism, Behaviorism, Gestalt psychology, and Psychoanalysis. Finally, we will progress through the major developments that occurred in the 20th century and conclude with a discussion of present-day psychology. By the end of the course, students will have gained a broad knowledge of the history of our discipline and should have a greater sense of where we have been and where we are moving to next.



Assessment Methods

Exams in this course are closed book. The use of resources, including class notes, the textbook, online resources, and calculators is prohibited during the exams in this course. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams.

Assessment Methods

(1) Midterm Exam #1

- Could include any material covered in class as well as from the assigned textbook chapters
- Chapters covered include: 1, 2, & 3
- Comprised of a mix of <u>multiple choice questions</u>
- Worth 25% of the final grade

(2) Midterm Exam #2

- Could include any material covered in class as well as from the assigned textbook chapters presented after Midterm #1
- Chapters covered include: 4, 5, 6, & 7
- Comprised of a mix of *multiple choice questions*
- Worth 25% of the final grade

(3) Term Paper

Students will be required to complete a term paper on a historical figure in psychology of their choosing. When writing the proposal, students should adhere to APA guidelines (7th edition).

- The term paper is due March 28, 2022
- Please submit an electronic copy on the D2L system on the due date.

- Without instructor approval, late assignments will be penalized 10% per day, including weekends. Students may be asked for documentation.
- Worth 20% of the final grade

(4) Final Exam

Scheduled by the registrar during the fall exam period

- 3 hours will be allocated for the exam
- The final exam IS NOT CUMULATIVE
- Could include any material covered in class as well as from the assigned textbook chapters
- Chapters covered include: 8, 9, 10, 11, 13, 14, & 15
- Comprised of a mix of <u>multiple choice questions & short answer</u>
- You will NOT be allowed to use any of the following during the test: iPods, iPads, smartphones, computers, books or notes
- Worth 30% of the final grade

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

It is at the instructor's discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades. To determine final letter grades, final percentage grades will be rounded up or down to the nearest whole percentage (e.g., 89.5% will be rounded up to 90% = A but 89.4% will be rounded down to 89% = A-).

Supporting Documentation

Students may be asked to provide supporting documentation for an exemption/special request. This may include, but is not limited to, a prolonged absence from a course where participation is required, a missed course assessment, a deferred examination, or an appeal. Students are encouraged to submit documentation that will support their situation. Supporting documentation may be dependent on the reason noted in their personal statement/explanation provided to explain their situation. This could be medical certificate/documentation, references, police reports, invitation letter, or a statutory declaration, etc. The decision to provide supporting documentation that best suits the situation is at the discretion of the student. Students cannot be required to provide specific supporting documentation, such as a medical note.

Students can make a Statutory Declaration as their supporting documentation (available at <u>ucalgary.ca/registrar</u>). This requires students to make a declaration in the presence of a Commissioner for Oaths. It demonstrates the importance of honest and accurate information provided and is a legally binding declaration. Several registered Commissioners for Oaths are available to students at no charge, on campus, please see <u>ucalgary.ca/registrar</u>.

Falsification of any supporting documentation will be taken very seriously and may result in disciplinary action through the Academic Discipline regulations or the Student Non-Academic Misconduct policy.

Absence From A Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are **NOT** an option without the approval of the instructor. Students who miss a test/exam have up to 48 hours to contact the instructor to ask for a makeup test/exam. It's the instructor's discretion if they will allow a make-up exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup test/exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled test/exam. Once approved by the instructor a makeup test/exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed test/exam on a day/time scheduled by the instructor. If a student cannot write their final exam on the date assigned by the Registrar's Office, they need to apply for a deferred exam https://www.ucalgary.ca/registrar/exams/deferred-exams.
