This is an in-person class held on campus.


Prerequisites

PSYC 200 and PSYC 201 (or equivalent) – Principles of Psychology I & II

Required Text

Kassin, Fein, S., Markus, H. R., & Brehm, S. S. (2020). *Social psychology* (Eleventh Edition.). Cengage Learning.

This text can be purchased at the University of Calgary Bookstore. Key material from the text will be covered in class; however, obtaining a copy of the text will be necessary to excel in the course, as there will be questions on the tests that are covered in the text but not in class. Using an earlier edition is not officially endorsed (as I cannot be 100% certain whether all text-based test questions are covered by earlier editions) but doing so will likely not result in a radically different final grade in the course.

Tests (4 x 15% = 60%). There will be four in-class tests during this course; all tests will be multiple-choice and cover material since the previous test (or start of the course, for Test 1). All material covered in lecture and in the assigned chapters is testable. Tests in this course are closed book. The use of resources, including class notes, the textbook, online resources, and calculators is prohibited during the tests in this course. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the test either in person or electronically during tests.

Thought paper (10%). You will submit one thought paper (2-3 pages double-spaced in length with 12 pt Times New Roman font and 1" margins). In this written assignment, you will apply social psychological theories or concepts that you have learned about in class (either in textbook and/or lecture) to a real life event (either from your own life or from a newspaper article). This paper is intended to help you develop insight into everyday experiences using concepts discussed in the course. More information and a detailed rubric will be uploaded to D2L.

Research proposal (5% + 25% = 30%). You will submit one research proposal (25%) in which you will propose a novel study to test a social psychological question of your choice. Your research proposal should be 4-5 pages double-spaced in length, with 12 pt Times New Roman font and 1" margins. It should include 1) a rationale for the research with background literature to support your hypothesis or hypotheses, and 2) a description of the method that you propose to test your research question. This research proposal is intended to help you to think about social psychological questions from a scientific perspective. Two weeks before the proposal is due, you will bring a draft of the proposal to class for an in-class peer-review session (5%). More information and detailed rubrics for both portions of this assessments will be uploaded to D2L.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer tests/exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

Extra Research Participation Course Credit is Not Offered for this Course. Students in this course can, however, earn an extra 1% towards their final grade in the course by scoring 100% on the Bonus Course Outline Quiz which will be available on D2L (Assessments > Quizzes). Note that the last day to submit this Quiz without late penalty will be Friday, Jan. 20th, and the last it will be available is Friday Jan. 27th.

Supporting Documentation

Students may be asked to provide supporting documentation for an exemption/special request. This may include, but is not limited to, a prolonged absence from a course where participation is required, a missed course assessment, a deferred examination, or an appeal. Students are encouraged to submit documentation that will support their situation. Supporting documentation may be dependent on the reason noted in their personal statement/explanation provided to explain their situation. This could be medical certificate/documentation, references, police reports, invitation letter, or a statutory declaration, etc. The decision to provide supporting documentation that best suits the situation is at the discretion of the student. Students cannot be required to provide specific supporting documentation, such as a medical note.

Students can make a Statutory Declaration as their supporting documentation (available at ucalgary.ca/registrar. This requires students to make a declaration in the presence of a Commissioner for Oaths. It demonstrates the importance of honest and accurate information provided and is a legally binding declaration. Several registered Commissioners for Oaths are available to students at no charge, on campus, please see ucalgary.ca/registrar.

Falsification of any supporting documentation will be taken very seriously and may result in disciplinary action through the Academic Discipline regulations or the Student Non-Academic Misconduct policy.

Absence From Test/Exam/Other In-Class Assessment

Makeup assessments are **NOT** an option without the approval of the instructor https://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/g-1-1.html. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup assessment may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from the regularly scheduled assessment. Once approved by the instructor a makeup test/exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed test/exam on a day/time scheduled by the instructor.

If you miss an in-class assessment (i.e., a Test or the Peer-Review of Research Proposal)

complete this <u>In-Class Assessment Make-Up Request Form</u> within 48-hours of the missed assessment (i.e., 48 hours before or after), indicating ALL possible times that you can complete a make-up assessment in the 2-week period following the original assessment date. Once the form deadline has passed the instructor will then let you know the date, time, and format of your make-up assessment within 24-hours via email. If you do complete the form in time OR are unable to complete a make-up assessment within 2-weeks following the original date, you will receive a grade of zero on the assessment (unless you apply for, and are granted, an official Deferral of Term Work, see below).

NOTE: As Test 4 falls on the last day of class, the last day to write a make-up assessment for Test 4 will be Apr. 19th (5 business days after the end of classes, which is Apr. 12th). If you cannot write a makeup test before that date, the instructor will provide you with the information for requesting a Deferral of Term Work; however, note that deferral of term work will likely result in a delay in receiving your final grade for the course.

Late Written/Submitted Assessments

In this course, due dates have been carefully set to space out the work evenly throughout the semester and to ensure that you receive your grade (and, when applicable, written feedback) in time for it to be useful in preparing for future assessments. Thus, it is in your best interest to plan to submit the written submissions before the due dates indicated (see list of dates on p. 2 and full course schedule on pp. 4-6). However, I understand that sometimes life events (e.g., technological issues, pet/child care, mental/physical illness) can pose challenges to meeting academic deadlines. Thus, both assignments in this course come with a built-in one-week extension period (including weekends/holidays) and then are penalized 5% per day (including weekends/holidays) to a maximum of 7 days (35% deduction), after which you may no longer submit the assignment and will receive a grade of zero for that assessment. Note that emailed submissions will not be graded, and email requests for extensions will

not be answered, except for instances where a student has an Accommodation from SAS (see below) that allows for extensions beyond 1-week. In the event of an acute and serious illness, injury, or other event please book a meeting with the instructor using the link provided at the top of this document.

Grades

Except for the final assessments completed/submitted in the last 2-weeks of the course, grades for all assessments will be published on D2L within 2 weeks of completing/submitting the assessment (for specific grading deadlines, see the schedule on pp. 4-6). Grades for the Tests, Bonus Course Outline Quiz, and Peer-Review of Research Proposal will be uploaded/published by the instructor. The Thought Papers and Research Proposals will be graded by your TA.

Reappraisal of Graded Term Work (from http://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/i-2.html)
A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (term paper, essay, test, etc.) has been unfairly graded, may have the work reappraised as follows:

- For Assessments graded by the TA (see above section), the student must first discuss the grade and feedback with the TA. Then, if not satisfied with the reason given for the original grade or, if applicable, the revised grade, the student can arrange a meeting with the instructor (booking link at the top of this document).
- **For Tests**, the student must first view the exam answer key with the review TAs in one of the times and locations listed on D2L. Then, if there are lingering questions/concerns, the student can arrange a meeting with the instructor (booking link at the top of this document).
- For any other concern regarding grades, students can arrange a meeting with the instructor (booking link at the top of this document). For concerns easily addressed over email (e.g., a missing grade on D2L), students can send an email to the instructor rather than setting up a meeting.

If, after meeting with the course instructor, a student is not satisfied with the reason given for the original grade or, if applicable, the revised grade, the student can take the matter to the head of the department offering the course within 2 business days of receiving the decision from the instructor, who will arrange for a reappraisal of the work within the next ten business days.
