Course Description

The task of behavioural neuroscience is to explain behaviour in terms of the activities of the brain. This course explores a wide variety of topics that may include the neural basis of learning, memory, sensation, and thinking, as well as behavioural and neurodegenerative disorders that arise from nervous system malfunction.

There will be 4 quizzes spread throughout the course; each quiz will be worth 2.5% of your final grade (for a total of 10%). **The quizzes will test you on the lecture material that has been covered since the last assessment**, and are designed to keep you up to date with the course material. **Quizzes will be done at the beginning of lecture**, and will consist of 1 to 3 short answer questions. Please ensure that you have a writing utensil with you at the beginning of each class.

There are three exams for this course; the two midterms will consist of multiple-choice questions. Questions can be drawn from lecture material and the assigned textbook chapters. Midterm #1 will be held on October 12th and is worth 25% of your final grade. Midterm #2 is scheduled for November 9th and will also be worth 25% of your final grade. Midterm #2 **will NOT be cumulative**. The final exam will be scheduled by the registrar and is worth 30% of your final grade, it will include multiple-choice and short answer questions; **the final exam will NOT be cumulative**.

Quizzes and the short answer questions on the final exam will be graded using a similar format. Half marks will be given if it is clear that you know the general answer, but have omitted specific details of scientific terms. Full marks will be given to those that include specifics, and employ the correct terminology and concepts. Unless specified by your instructor, **no books, notes, computers, calculators, or cellular phones will be allowed during exam/quiz writing**.

The written assignment should be two pages in length (double-spaced, 12 point Times New Roman font with 1" margins), it is due by the end of the day on November 18th (handed in via the assignment dropbox in D2L) and is worth 10% of your final grade. Your goal is to find and read a current news article describing research about the brain, and compare it to the original source, as well as relate it back to our discussion on brain and behaviour in the classroom. Further details regarding the assignment will be provided in class and posted on D2L. Late papers will not be accepted without appropriate documentation.

Department of Psychology Grade Distribution Policy

The distribution of grades in Psychology courses (the percentage of A grades, B grades, etc.) will be similar to the distribution of grades in other courses in the Faculty of Arts. The Department monitors the grade distributions of 200-, 300-, and 400-level courses in the Faculty to ensure that the grade distributions in Psychology courses are comparable. Based on these reviews, students can expect that 1) up to 30% of grades in 200- and 300-level psychology courses will be "A" grades (A+, A, and A-), and 2) up to 40% of grades 400-level psychology courses will be "A" grades.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology professors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: *Excellent Performance*. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: *Satisfactory Performance*. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

As stated in the University Calendar, it is at the instructor's discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades. To determine final letter grades, final percentage grades will be rounded up or down to the nearest whole percentage (e.g., 89.5% will be rounded up to 90% = A but 89.4% will be rounded down to 89% = A-).

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class; no reappraisal of term work is permitted after the 15 days. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Students should examine sections of the University Calendar that present a Statement of Intellectual honesty and definitions and penalties associated with Plagiarism/Cheating/Other Academic Misconduct.

Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. Travel During Exams

Consistent with University regulations, students are expected to be available to write scheduled exams at any time during the official December and April examination periods. Students are advised to wait until the final examination schedule is posted before making any travel arrangements. Under no circumstances will this be accommodated by the department.

Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) Act

The FOIP legislation disallows the practice of having student's retrieve tests and assignments from a public place. Therefore, tests and assignments may be returned to students during class/lab, or during office hours, or will be made available only for viewing during exam review sessions scheduled by the Department. Tests and assignments will be shredded after one year. Instructors should take care to not link students' names with their grades, UCIDs, or other FOIP-sensitive information.

Course Credits for Research Participation (Max 2% of final grade)

Students in most psychology courses are eligible to participate in Departmentally approved research and earn credits toward their final grades. **A maximum of two credits (2%) per course, including this course, may be applied to the student's final grade. Students earn 0.5% (0.5 credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation.** The demand for timeslots may exceed the supply in a given term. Thus, students are not guaranteed that there will be enough studies available to them to meet their credit requirements. Students should seek studies early in the term and should frequently check for open timeslots. The last day to participate in studies and to assign or reassign earned credits to courses is **Dec 9, 2016**.
