Course Description and Goals

This component will provide students with an overview of theory and ethical practice regarding people from marginalized and/or racialized groups. It will address unintentional racism and systemic discrimination in psychological theory and practice and provide an opportunity to develop skills in working with people whose experiences; cultural values and norms; and health beliefs differ from dominant group populations in Canada.

Required Text

Evaluation

- Students will work in groups of two or three (depending on class size). Each group will be
 assigned a chapter from the textbook and a marginalized population to focus on, and provide a
 45 minute presentation to the class on the chapter and its implications for counseling the target
 group. 40%
- EACH student will meet with at least one member of his/her assigned target community to determine some of the needs/concerns/expectations of clinical psychology services. The findings will be incorporated into their class presentations. 20%
- 3. Each class, students will come prepared to discuss the assigned readings having prepared thoughtful questions or points of interest for discussion. 20%
- 4. Students will submit a thought paper (no more than 3 pages) about their experiences in the course. What was learned, what gaps (if any) exist in their training, how they can be more effective in their careers when working with diverse populations. 20% **DUE December 9**

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class; no reappraisal of term work is permitted after the 15 days. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Students should examine sections of the University Calendar that present a Statement of Intellectual honesty and definitions and penalties associated with Plagiarism/Cheating/Other Academic Misconduct.

Academic Accommodation

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations. Absence From A Test/Exam (N/A for this class)

Makeup tests/exams are **NOT** an option without an official University medical excuse (see the University Calendar). A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a test/exam for health reasons; the student will be required to pay any cost associated with this Statement. Students who miss a test/exam have up to 48 hours to contact the instructor and to schedule a makeup test/exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup test/exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled test/exam. Travel During Exams (N/A for this class)

Consistent with University regulations, students are expected to be available to write scheduled exams at any time during the official December and April examination periods.
